BOOKMARK

Dear Friends.

The *Friends* of the Punta Gorda Library is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year. Our mission and purpose continues to be the same as when a group of citizens first came together to form a *Friends* group 50 years ago.

Punta Gorda is a historic city which has prospered and grown due to the men and the women who donated their time and talents to every aspect of our community. We are grateful for the help of those citizens who recognized the need to include the local library in their endeavors.

In 1967, the late Vernon Peeples chaired a meeting to discuss a proposed *Friends* of the Library Group. The meeting was held at the old Punta Gorda Library located at the corner of Retta Esplanade and Cross Street.

Kenton Haymans, local attorney with Farr, Farr, Haymans, Moseley and Odom, was chosen by acclamation as the temporary chair to form a *Friends* of the Library group. Included in the meeting were the Punta Gorda Librarian, two Charlotte County Commissioners and the Mayor and Vice Mayor of Punta Gorda. A Herald-News story dated February 9, 1967, stated this group was being formed to promote the library and to bring it before the community in the most favorable light and to aid the library in funding for books and other items and perform other unofficial acts on behalf of the library.

The *Friends* group was established and began their service to the library and to the community. It was a proud moment for those Board members to be a part of the dedication of the new Punta Gorda Library on West Henry Street, December 6, 1974. The dedication program included the names of the leadership of the *Friends* and gave recognition to the *Friends* for their donation of a flag pole to the new library.

In 1977, the *Friends*, under the leadership of Chairman U. S. Cleveland, Vice-Chairman Robert Wilford, Secretary Deanna Patterson and Treasurer Robert Eliott, an application for incorporation was made to the State of Florida. On August 9, 1977, the Certificate of Incorporation as a non-profit under Florida Statues was issued to the "Friends Library of Punta Gorda, Inc."

I have been walking down memory lane while going through old newspaper clippings and reading about the volunteers and the Board members who donated so much time to make the Punta Gorda Library a vital institution within our community. It is clear that over the last four decades, the Board of Directors has stayed true to the *Friends* mission of serving the library, the patrons and the community with both our time and financial resources.

We have been successful, in large part, to the support of so many in our community who have, and continue to be members of the *Friends*. There is an individual/family membership for \$15 a year or a lifetime membership for \$150. Local businesses can join as Business Patrons for \$100 a year. Each membership is a way to support the *Friends* so we can help the library provide programs as well as books and other media and make other improvements as needed. We have been setting money aside for a number of years which we will donate in furnishing and equipping the new library. Our 2017 membership

drive is underway right now. If you have not renewed your membership yet, we ask that you do. If you have never joined, please consider. And if you have friends or neighbors who love libraries, ask them to join.

A strong membership helps us continue our mission to serve the library community. My thanks to all who join.

Community News

Update on the New Punta Gorda Library



The City of Punta Gorda donated the land where the new county library will be built on West Henry Street. City work crews are currently excavating the site so the land will be ready for construction once the final library design is complete and the building permits have been obtained.

There have been several stories in the local newspapers about the status of the new library. The rumors that a new library will not be built are not true. Funding for the new library is coming from the one cent sales tax revenue approved by the voters several years ago. The County Commissioners approved many different projects with the projected revenue, \$6.9 million dollars of which was allocated for the new library. This funding currently provides for a baseline design with an exterior that some have called a "box store look". Since the new library is being built in the historic area of Punta Gorda, the Friends and many residents would like an enhanced architectural design. The County has applied for a \$500,000 state grant, and until they know if the state grant will be awarded, the design process is on hold.

The Friends hope that additional funding is provided quickly so our new library can be built sooner, rather than later.

Youth and Libraries

The 41-year-old mother struggled, backing the 1964 Ford Galaxy without power steering into parallel parking in downtown Tallahassee. We walked the half-block to the public library. I was the middle child, a 3rd grader. The old building with peeling white paint, previously an Elks lodge, was never intended to be a library. We entered and took an immediate left, downstairs to the children's section in the basement. The stairs were narrow and squeaked. Our nostrils were filled with the aroma, a unique blend of book and damp basement.

The public library offered much more than did my school library. The children's section was large, and we could check out more books there than at school. We were proud of our library cards, printed on heavy paper card stock. I had thought that the tiny drawers of the card catalog were files, off limits to the public. I was startled when my mother confidently opened one of those drawers, and I asked her what she was doing! She explained its purpose - for patrons to use it to find books. Soon, I mastered author, title, and subject cards, learning to enjoy the hunt - the quest for books and information.

During my middle school years, I began exploring the adult, teen, and reference areas. The library became a place to lose myself for long periods, wandering the stacks, finding new knowledge and different perspectives on the world. It was a refuge. It was a place where we could be dropped off while our mother shopped downtown. The building was unsafe. Exits were few, ventilation was poor, moisture was everpresent, and the building was overflowing with combustible paper media. Plaster sometimes fell, but funding for a new building was not there. After I was grown, the new library and branches were built. The Friends group in Leon County labored every step of the way to make it possible.

The 41-year-old woman is now 90. My mother drives her Honda Accord to a branch library to pick up the books that are being held for her. She doesn't have to deal with stairs and parallel parking there.

Whether it's an 8-year-old boy or a 90-year-old woman, libraries pass on the culture and nourish the intellect in countless ways. Funds remain tight for American libraries. As always, they depend on citizens to patronize, volunteer, give, and advocate for their local libraries.

Book Reviews

Don't Sleep There Are Snakes by Dan Everett

A riveting account of the astonishing experiences and discoveries made by linguistic Daniel Everett while he lived with the Piraha, a small tribe of Amazonian Indians in central Brazil.

Everett, then a Christian missionary, arrived among the Piraha in 1977 with his wife and three young children intending to convert them. What he found was a language that defies all existing linguistic theories and reflects a way of life that evades contemporary understanding: The Piraha have no counting system and no fixed terms for color. They have no concept of war or of personal property. They live entirely in the present. Everett became so obsessed with their language and its cultural and linguistic implications, and with the remarkable contentment with which they live, that he eventually lost his faith in the God to which he'd hoped to introduce them.

Over three decades, Everett spent a total of seven years among the Piraha, and his account of this lasting sojourn is an engrossing exploration of language that questions modern linguistic theory. It is also an anthropological investigation, an adventure story, and a riveting memoir of a life profoundly affected by exposure to a different culture. Written with extraordinary acuity, sensitivity and openness, it is fascinating from first to last, rich with unparalleled insight into the nature of language, thought, and life itself.

The Inn at Eagle Point by Sherryl Woods

This is one of the books in the Chesapeake Shores series. The setting is in Maryland. Abby O'Brien Winters, divorced with small young daughters and a demanding career on Wall Street, received a panicked phone call from her younger sister, Jess. The inn that Jess is renovating is going into foreclosure.

Not only is she dealing with family (her dad in particular) but with Trace Riley, who is working at the bank and handling the foreclosure. Abby left Trace 10 years ago but he still loves her. It's not only a love story, but a story of sisters standing up for each other.

It's a book similar to the author Debbie Macomber

The Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead

The story takes place beginning in 1820 and recreates the unique terrors for black people in the Pre-Civil War era. The author's saga is of America and the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day. This is one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage—Cora is a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia, where she was born. Her mother managed to escape when Cora was a young child. When Cora was about 17, a man Caesar (age 24) arrives to the plantation from Virginia and he knows of the underground railroad and they decide to take the risk to escape. They make it to South Carolina, however, it is not a welcoming state for blacks. Caesar is separated from Cora during their flee to get to this railroad. Cora proceeds to hide with a couple at a farmhouse, however, they discover there is a slave catcher hired from the plantation master and they must get her out of their home for their own safety. They tell her how to find conductors who operate the secret network of tracks and tunnels beneath the southern soil. Cora embarks on a harrowing flight, state by state, seeking true freedom. A fictional story that portrays the reality of slave life. *Oprah's Book Club*


